

3 main options:

Vocational course at a Further Education College

Apprenticeship

What does *Vocational* mean?

Available at local colleges (and some 6th forms)

2 types of vocational course (BTECs/T Levels and skills-based courses)

What are our local colleges?











There are no fees for tuition (if you are under 19)

Financial help for 6th form or college 16-19 Bursary - If you are in care, or you face genuine financial hardship, you may be able to get help with fares and equipment costs






Staying in education or training

If you live in England, you have to stay in education or training until the age of 18. You don't have to stay in school and you can get a job if you want - but training needs to be part of what you are doing. In Wales, you have to stay in school until the age of 16. Wherever you are, we have a range of courses and training options available for you to search through.

You may choose to stay on in school, move to college, or take up a workbased traineeship or apprenticeship. You can also decide whether you want to study and train full
